# Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

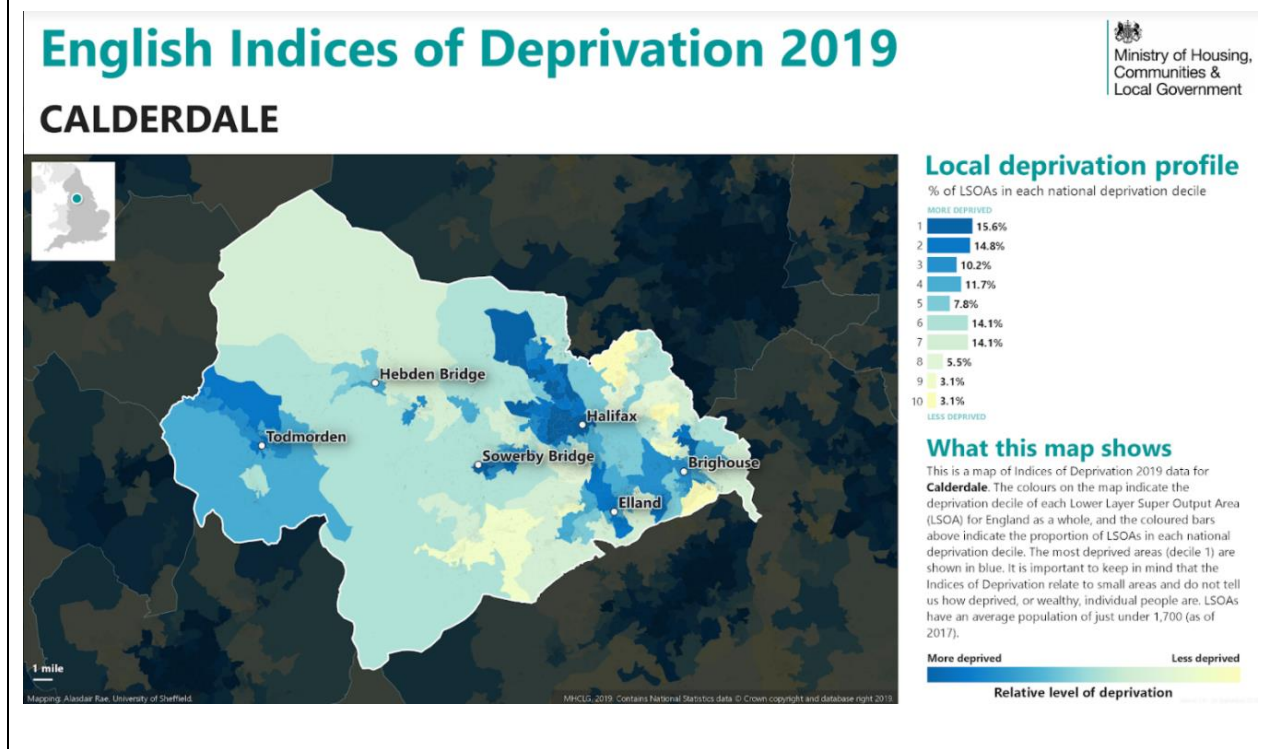
## Statement of intent

At Bolton Brow Primary Academy, we target the use of Pupil Premium Grant funding to ensure that our disadvantaged pupils receive the highest quality of education to enable them to become active, socially responsible citizens of the future. We recognise that disadvantaged children can face a wide range of barriers which may impact on their learning. When making decisions about using Pupil Premium funding it is important to consider the context of the school and the subsequent challenges faced. This alongside research conducted by the EEF. Common barriers to learning for disadvantaged children can be: less support at home, weak language and communication skills, lack of confidence, more frequent behaviour difficulties and attendance and punctuality issues. There may also be complex family situations that prevent children from flourishing. The challenges are varied and there is no “one size fits all”.

**Our ultimate objectives are to:**

- ✓ Remove barriers to learning created by poverty, family circumstance and background.
- ✓ Narrow the attainment gaps between disadvantaged pupils and their non-disadvantaged counterparts both within school and nationally.
- ✓ Ensure ALL pupils are able to read fluently and with good understanding to enable them to access the breadth of the curriculum.
- ✓ Develop confidence in their ability to communicate effectively in a wide range of Contexts.
- ✓ Enable pupils to look after their social and emotional wellbeing and to develop resilience.
- ✓ Access a wide range of opportunities to develop their knowledge and understanding of the world.
  - ✓ Develop evidenced based approaches to support teaching and learning.

**Achieving our objectives:**

In order to achieve our objectives and overcome identified barriers to learning we will:

- > Provide all teachers with high quality CPD to ensure that pupils access effective quality first teaching.
- > Provide targeted intervention and support to quickly address identified gaps in learning including the use of small group work, 1:6 tuition.
- > Target funding to ensure that all pupils have access to trips, residential, first-hand learning experiences.
- > Provide opportunities for all pupils to participate in enrichment activities including sport and music.
- > Provide appropriate mental health & well-being support to enable pupils to access learning within and beyond the classroom.

**Key Principals:**

We will ensure that effective teaching, learning and assessment meets the needs of all pupils through the rigorous analysis of data. Class teachers will identify through the class pupil premium plan specific intervention and support for individual pupils which will be reviewed at least termly. Alongside academic support, we will ensure that those pupils who have social, emotional and mental health needs will access high quality provision from appropriately trained adults.

## Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	Social, emotional, and mental health. Observations and discussions indicate that the well-being and emotional development of a proportion of our disadvantage pupils continues to be impacted due to the Covid pandemic.
2	Speech, language and communication – Assessment, observations and discussions indicate a proportion of pupils have under-developed oral language skills and vocabulary gaps. These under-developed skills are evident from nursery through to KS2.
3	Gaps in reading, writing, maths and phonics; a proportion of our disadvantage pupils continues to be impacted due to the Covid pandemic.
4	Access to wider opportunities – Lack of enrichment opportunities for a large proportion of our pupil premium children.

## Intended outcomes

## Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

### Pupil premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2020 to 2021 academic year.

**1. To improve maths attainment amongst disadvantaged pupils.  
Achieve outcomes in-line with or above national average by the end of KS**

Mathematics – 80% of children in receipt of pupil premium (5 children) are achieving at least in line with age related expectations. Average scaled score 100.8 which results in a -1.5-value added.

*Comparison data.*

*DfE data Key 2 Attainment - 59% of disadvantaged passed.*

*National data from FFT (Note this is based on all groups not disadvantaged) – 71% passed & National scaled score 103.8.*

**2. To improve reading attainment amongst disadvantaged pupils.  
Achieve outcomes in-line with or above national average by the end of KS**  
**2.**

Reading – 80% of children in receipt of pupil premium (5 children) are achieving at least in line with age related expectations. Average scaled score 104.5 which results in a +0.8-value added.

*Comparison data.*

*DfE data Key 2 Attainment - 74% of disadvantaged passed.*

*National data from FFT (Note this is based on all groups not disadvantaged) - 74% passed & National scaled score 104.8.*

**3. To improve writing attainment amongst disadvantaged pupils.  
Achieve outcomes in-line with or above national average by the end of KS**  
**2.**

Writing – 100% of children in receipt of pupil premium (5 children) are achieving at least in line with age related expectations. Average scaled score 103.0 which results in a +2.1-value added.

*DfE data Key 2 Attainment - 58% of disadvantaged passed.*

*National data from FFT (Note this is based on all groups not disadvantaged) - 69% passed & National scaled score 99.6.*



GPS – 100% of children in receipt of pupil premium (5 children) are achieving at least in line with age related expectations. Average scaled score 104.8 which results in a +0.8-value added.

**4. To improve phonics attainment amongst disadvantaged pupils.  
Achieve at least 90% of pupils in Year 1 to pass the Phonics Check**

2023 Y1 Phonics School Disadvantaged vs National 'Other' (Not Disadvantaged) 20% of pupils are Disadvantaged - 6 pupils - 100% of Disadvantaged pupils achieved the standard compared to 78.9% of 'Other' pupils Nationally. Therefore, the careful consideration given in selecting a new scheme (FFT Success for All) and the careful implementation of it ensures phonics is a strength of the school.

**5. Improve oral language skills and vocabulary among disadvantage pupils.**

**Assessments and observations indicate improvements in oral language amongst disadvantaged pupils. This is evident when triangulated with other sources of evidence including deep dives of books.**

Standardised SaLT assessments indicate improvements in oral language amongst disadvantaged students.

“Talk Boost’ and other language interventions identify all children having made progress from their starting point when beginning the interventions.

Early years summative assessment information identifies improvements in oral language across the cohort.

**6. To support and sustain the well-being of all pupils in our school particularly those who are disadvantaged. Increasing levels of well-being demonstrated by:** Qualitative data, student voice and parent and teacher surveys.  
Baseline and end point intervention groups

The school works closely with many families across school of this group of children who have been supported through pastoral groups in school and supported at occasions like Tea & Toast.

- Last academic year pupil premium attendance was 94.9% which is well above the FFT national average, which was 91.3%. this is a +3.6 difference.

- The school band enhanced the cultural experiences of all who took part. It boosted confidence, school attendance and concentration.
- The well-being week undertaken in 2022-2023 showed positive impact with this key group of children. *The final questionnaire which ascertained the well-being of pupils in our school identified that the 'disadvantaged group,' felt that things had improved since the baseline audit and the results showed that this group were no different to any other pupils in school.*
- Tea & Toast – provides each young person with a healthy, nutritious breakfast. It encourages table manners and social skills of a two-way conversation.
- Forest School sessions were run throughout the year for all children from EYFS to Year 6. Providing opportunities for children to attend Forest school sessions supported our commitment to closing the gap with attendance and case study work shows the impact that having this opportunity can have in improving attendance.
- Extending our offer of extra-curricular clubs before and after school has also had a positive impact for key children and supported their well-being and increased attendance at school this year.

We have reviewed our strategy plan and made changes to how we intend to use some of our budget this academic year. The Further Information section below provides more details about our planning, implementation, and evaluation processes.



## Further Information

***Our pupil premium strategy will be supplemented by additional activity that is not being funded by pupil premium or recovery premium. That will include:***

Utilising a DfE grant to train a senior mental health lead. Through this we will continue to develop our pupils' needs and give pupils a voice in how we address wellbeing.

Being part of the Mentally Healthy Steering Group, which provides school with additional training and advice and a mental health support worker half a day per week.
